Sermon

Lord, we give you this time; may what is spoken ring with truth; may what is heard and understood be touched by your Spirit, and may what is decided lead us on towards your Kingdom –

Happy Easter - so much to rejoice over; so much to be thankful for; unless you're in Ukraine. I wonder what priests & ministers in Ukraine are talking about this Easter?

Still, for us, here – so much to rejoice over – at last, Michael is going! So much to be thankful for – finally!

For me – so much to rejoice over; the friendship, love & forbearance of so many over so long...so much to be thankful for – the joy & privilege of being a minister at Tyndale.

For us all: Easter Day: laughter after tears; sunshine after rain; spring after winter....light after darkness...

Joy....- Mary, Mary Magdalene; Joanna, Mary the mother of James, & the other women – imagine, if you can.. They began the day filled with grief; laden with spices, ready for mourning duty. Then, on Easter Day...an empty tomb...bewilderment, terror & fear, memories, all that fading away & giving way to incredulity....amazement......hardly daring to breathe.....at last...joy

Easter Day: a day for joy! One of the no doubt many things I could be criticised for is a lack of joy. Somebody said way back about one of my Easter services – not much joy..

I admit it – glass half empty, me, it's often been said. In ministry terms everybody has one of two theologies – either the Theology of the Cross or the Theology of the Resurrection

Me – the Theology of the Cross every time..Lent is my season....and Advent – yearning (!!) – a ministry focussed on the difficulties, suffering, faith in the real world.

I must have told you this before; (one of the problems of a long ministry – you're in danger of repeating yourself) in my first church I lined up with other clergy – Anglicans, Methodists, Roman Catholics – they were all in their dark cloaks and cassocks; I was wearing a black academic gown –

on Good Friday, for a march of witness round the streets; it was raining, cold and grey..we stopped at various points for readings from the passion; Jesus carrying his cross; weeping women in Jerusalem – you know the kind of thing – Easter Sunday that year dawned warm & sunny; we all held services in our churches while the local house church had a big, loud, colourful 'picnic of praise in the park'....toddlers in push chairs, colourful dresses, banners, guitars and drums, free food and drink.

Which version of Christianity do you think was more *joyful?!!* Mine has always been the Good Friday version – you must know that by now.

But it is Easter Day. I wonder what ministers in Ukraine are talking about this Easter?

Here's something from a description of Easter in Ukraine..

The preparation begins two months in advance. People fast with strict devotion; the country is passionate about adhering to the faith. Everyone awaits Easter day; a festive mood blooms throughout the country & families come

together to celebrate with food.

Easter, by the way, is the Orthodox church Easter – this year it's next week

What are the priests talking about this year? New life? Spring? Easter Eggs, food, community – all the rest? It must be hard, don't you think – to find joy in Ukraine ATM – at Easter or at any other time for that matter

The Theology of the Cross then...? But you know, we can't leave it there, not if we want to be true to the Christian faith in its entirety – it's not one or the other, is it? It's both –

As I'm sure I've said before – (more than a few times probably; that's the thing about a long ministry – one is in danger of repeating oneself...fortunately, mostly no one can remember what I said from one week – one *minute!* - to the next...!)

Good Friday & Easter Day together.. The theology of the Cross & the theology of the Resurrection together..

Mary and the other women, in the story, go on Easter Sunday to the tomb & find it empty, & in their bewilderment and terror they meet two strangers in dazzling white who tell them 'He is not here, but has risen' – they run to tell the disciples, who think it's all an 'idle tale' – fake news...staged....a conspiracy? so Peter goes to have a look for himself & he returns home 'amazed at what had happened'

But did you notice what the men said? 'Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, & be crucified, & on the third day rise again.'

Easter, I think, depends on where you stand. 'Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee

That's where the joy begins for us today, my friends....while he was still in Galilee..while they were still in Ukraine....while we are still in this ministry for that matter – not long to go now...!

While he was still in Galilee..you see, this Easter as every Easter really – as every day – we are living in the shadow of the cross and the light of the empty tomb *every day*..

We are living by faith every day...every day is Good Friday and Easter Day for us - the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again.'

That's what Jesus said *while he was still in Galilee*...that's how he lived...by faith – imagine Jesus saying those words, knowing they applied to him, yet just like us having to believe, to trust – the Son of Man...handed over...crucified...rise again....

that's how we are to live....death lies all around all the time - Ukraine....Afghanistan.....

Syria....a hospital bed.....

Our faith is a faith for the present age not because it's wallowing in all the death and destruction; not because it's shackled to all the death and destruction

But because *in* the death and destruction; in the Galilees of the world *today*....in Ukraine, in Syria, Afghanistan, wherever – we are called to *live by faith*....:

Isaiah: I am about to create new heavens and a new earth; the former things shall not be remembered......be glad and rejoice for ever in what I am creating; I am about to create Jerusalem as a joy, and its people as a delight. no more shall the sound of weeping be heard in it, or the cry of distress. No more shall there be in it an infant that lives but a few days, or an old person who does not live out a lifetime;

They shall build houses and inhabit them; they shall plant vineyards and eat their fruit.....

like the days of a tree shall the days of my people be.. They shall not labour in vain, or bear children for calamity; for they shall be offspring blessed by the LORD—

The wolf and the lamb shall feed together, the lion shall eat straw like the ox...They shall not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain, says the LORD.

See? That's the vision – that's what we have to live by...when we stand at a committal; when we watch a news report out of Ukraine; when we think of abandoned families in Afghanistan, or destroyed homes in Aleppo or Mariupol, or murdered civilians in Bucha..

Or when we struggle to overcome our own worst instincts; or when we can't let go of past hurts..or when we wish things in our lives or amongst the ones we love were better than they are.

Or when we wish a ministry would end so we can get on with another one...

Then the vision...then the voice of those men in dazzling white rings in our ears....'why do you look for the living among the dead?'

I like to think that has been the inspiration behind my ministry. This service isn't about me, really, but there's no getting away from the fact of this ending today – and maybe Easter Day is an appropriate time for it.

I have been greatly privileged to minister here, among such a fine congregation of people, with such support and friendship over the years...

But many of the main things about this ministry have been when I have come alongside this or that person in grief and loss and we have shared, often enough, in all the pain

From my very first weekend back in 2002, through many others over the years – too many to count, really, too many to relate, certainly...so many times, over so many years –

And each time, in various ways & various locations we've gathered at a crematorium, or in here – you know the words: 'in this building, used to the sound of singing, place of baptisms, funerals, weddings, dedications- this building, where some have wept, and some been filled with joy...'

Each time we've faced the mix of joys and sorrows that are part of every human life...and at those times I have tried to live by faith – 'why do you look for the living among the dead?'

That's Easter, for us, wouldn't you say? OK this year it's a bit different because of all that's happening – and surely in Ukraine next week Easter will feel very different...

But the joy isn't tied to the bright colours and spring flowers and painted eggs or gorgeous costumes and gold and all the rest –

The Christian joy is there anyway...and the guns shall fall silent; and the shells shall no longer rain down...and the tombs shall be empty

'See, the home of God is among mortals. He will dwell with them; they will be his peoples,

& God himself will be with them; he will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away.'

& God's Kingdom shall come..that's Easter....Easter joy – that's the promise of today.

Thank you for the opportunity to minister in that joy – the joy of cross and resurrection - here these many years. I wish you all well as you live by faith – and as, once more, we come to this table, those words ring in our ears...: 'Why do you look for the living among the dead?'
